ADMINISTRATION

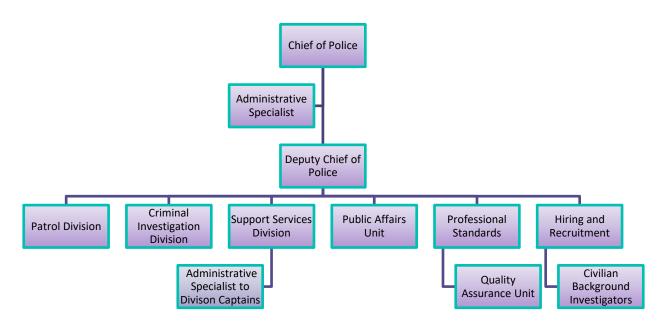

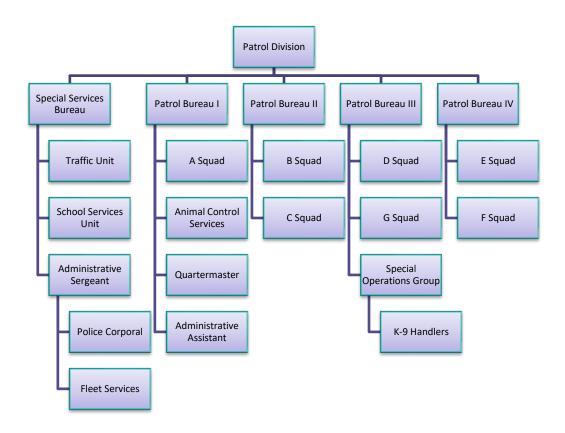
PATROL DIVISION

The Patrol Division is comprised of uniformed Patrol squads and various specialized units, including the Traffic, School Services, Special Operations Group, Special Enforcement Team, K-9, and Animal Control Units. Sworn officers partner with civilian professional staff to provide a wide variety of public safety, enforcement, community engagement,



and investigative services while also serving as first responders to both emergency and routine calls for service.

The Patrol Division participates in and supports many community partnerships and annual events. Patrol Officers are on duty 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to ensure the safety of our community.



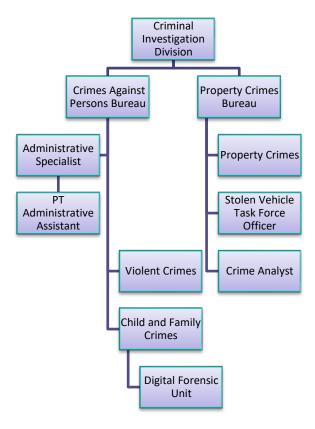
CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION DIVISION

The Criminal Investigation Division supports daily operations and crime reduction efforts by conducting investigations of assigned felony cases and significant incidents. The Division is responsible for interviewing witnesses, directing evidence collection and crime scene processing, following up on leads, identifying suspects, and building prosecutable cases against defendants. Investigators work closely with prosecutors to prepare cases for trial and provide testimony at several venues during the judicial process.

The Criminal Investigation Division utilized contemporary Intelligence-Led Policing strategies to assist in identifying specific areas, individuals, and methods of crime, prioritizing and focusing our efforts to detect, deter, and detain criminals.

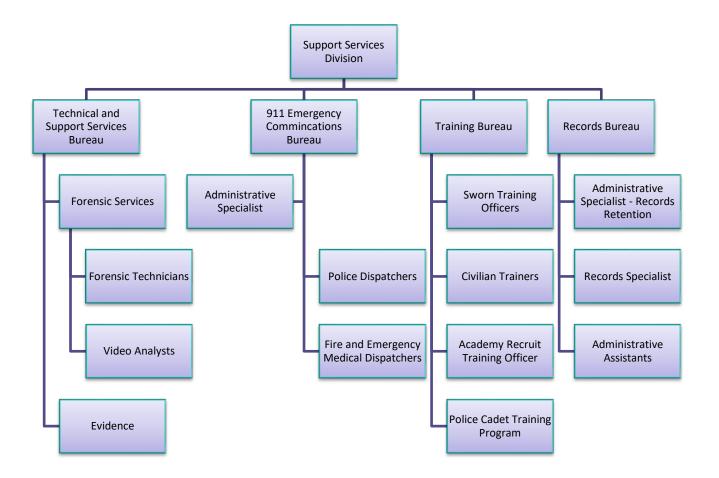


SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION:

- Our agency supported YFD accreditation, aligning dispatch operations with industry standards for excellence.
- Implemented LexisNexis Request a Report (RAR) which simplified the request process for citizens and staff.
- Assigned a Record Specialist at the Araby Substation on a monthly rotational basis to provide easier access to Records for citizens on the east side of the city.
- Installed a kiosk at the Araby Substation which allows citizens access to Cop Logic and RAR
- Enhanced our Power Engaged surveys. YPD sent out over 25,000 surveys regarding our calls for service. YPD has an 89% positive feedback rating from the surveys.

Awards & Recognition

The Yuma Police Department named the 2022 Officer, Sworn Supervisor, Detective, Professional Staff Supervisor, and Professional Staff Employee of the Year during the annual awards ceremony held on May 20th, 2023. Among those presented were several recipients of the Medal of Valor.

Officer of the Year – Officer Levi Jones

Officer Levi Jones served as School Resource Officer for Cibola High School in 2022. He exhibited dedication in performing his duties with the utmost respect, commitment, integrity, and professionalism. Levi, who also serves the community as a Threat Liaison Officer or TLO, was tasked with developing a workplace violence program to address YPD's partnership with local schools. He was instrumental in identifying key points and data that would best serve our stakeholders at the school districts. Levi custom-tailored



the training to address areas of concern directly linked with schools, staff, students, and the community. Levi partnered with other department TLOs and SROs to present the training to over 1000 community members throughout the year. More specifically, Levi trained staff and leadership from Yuma Union High School District, Crane School District, and Yuma School District One. The training has been a solid foundation upon which our partnerships with the schools in our community continue to build. Instant positive feedback was received from School Superintendents and leadership on the quality of training provided. Unquestionably, the exceptional contributions of Officer Levi Jones, with his knowledge and experience as an SRO and TLO, brought great honor to himself, the agency, and our profession. In addition to this, Levi continues to provide exceptional service with regard to police investigations, mentors' junior officers, and is at times sought out by supervisors for his opinion on his areas of expertise. It is for these reasons and more that Officer Levi Jones was awarded Officer of the Year.

Detective of the Year - Detective John Gawler

Currently assigned to the Digital Forensic Unit, Detective John Gawler has been involved in over 50 significant cases, completed detailed supplements, and written over 50 search warrants. He assists the detectives in all 3 bureaus in any case containing a nexus to digital devices or media by examining computers, cell phones, digital media, social media, call detail records, and other records from electronic service providers. He writes search warrants for GEO fence, CDR, call detail records, Facebook and Facebook Messenger, and other social media platforms.



Awards & Recognition

Detective Gawler generates reports from data examined/analyzed to identify evidence such as images, videos, communication, and location information. The reports are

made so that case agents can clearly locate and determine important pieces of information to aid in their investigation. In addition to all this, Detective Gawler also assists the county and federal

agencies located within Yuma to obtain digital evidence needed in their individual cases. He maintains and encourages the tracking and auditing of the systems they currently use to keep the technology up to date. Detective Gawler even assisted in the procurement of a GPS tracker during 2022, which, during its first use, was used to make an arrest of a wanted criminal. He maintains inventory of over \$100k worth of police department equipment within a secured area within Yuma Police Department. Detective Gawler was awarded Detective of the Year!

Professional Staff Supervisor of the Year - Adrian Rodriguez

Throughout 2022, Technical & Support Services Manager Adrian Rodriguez has shown a dedication to the Yuma Police Department for going above and beyond his assigned duties. Adrian has always found a way to help others or get the resources to help someone or a unit in need. For example, Adrian has been more than willing to help with events outside of his assigned duties such as the 2022 Scary and Safe Halloween event, the Gateway Easter Event, the GAIN event, the Fuddle Run, conducting or coordinating



presentations for the Citizens Academy, fingerprinting services, and the Elks Kid's Fingerprinting Day. Every time Adrian has been asked to help, he always comes through.

Adrian played a major role in the introduction of the BWC program and has been an advocate for the officers with the use of this program, assisting in the creation of the BWC Policy and listening to feedback to make processes more seamless for everyone involved. Adrian also completes grant-writing projects to obtain additional funds for equipment and supplies. In 2022, Adrian was able to secure a second BWC Video Analyst. Adrian continues to seek ways to innovate within the Yuma Police Department.

Adrian understands the need for employee wellness and has stepped up to oversee the Evidence Unit when its supervisor had a family emergency. In addition, Adrian understands and is flexible with his subordinates, empathizing and being flexible for them when situations arise requiring the need for them to care for their family. Adrian is always someone who can be counted on. It is for these reasons, and many more, that he was awarded Civilian Supervisor of the Year.

The Office Professional of Professional Responsibility

The Office of Professional Responsibility is pivotal in upholding the delicate equilibrium of trust and respect between a Police Department and its community. For effective policing and a fruitful partnership with the community, the Department must uphold a stringent commitment to integrity, credibility, and adherence to high professional standards. To achieve these standards, we must have rigorous self-assessment and rectification of any shortcomings uncovered. Consequently, the Department must establish and enforce standards for its personnel, ensuring adherence to these benchmarks.

The Department's authority, integrity, and reputation hinge on the conduct of its members in performing their multifaceted and demanding duties, which frequently involve interactions with the public. These interactions can engender queries, apprehensions, and grievances that necessitate prompt attention from the Department.

Internal Investigations provide a structured mechanism for identifying, documenting, and addressing employee misconduct or deficiencies, safeguarding proper conduct and the Department's policies against baseless allegations or scrutiny. Acknowledging the community's right to voice concerns about the Police Department, we are dedicated to investigating all allegations of employee misconduct violating policies or laws.

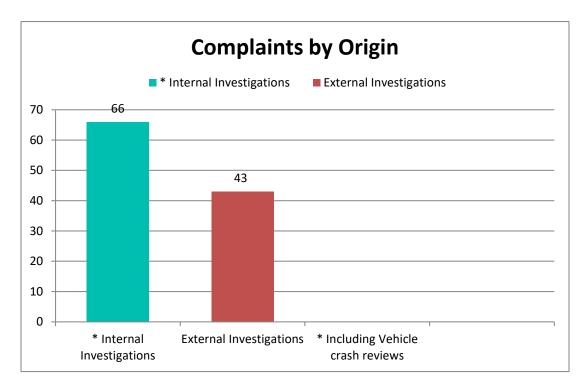
The Office of Professional Responsibility is overseen by one Lieutenant and two Sergeants, who directly report to the Chief of Police. This Unit assumes responsibility for orchestrating and managing internal investigations, handling citizen complaints, reviewing traffic collisions, and collecting data on the use of force.

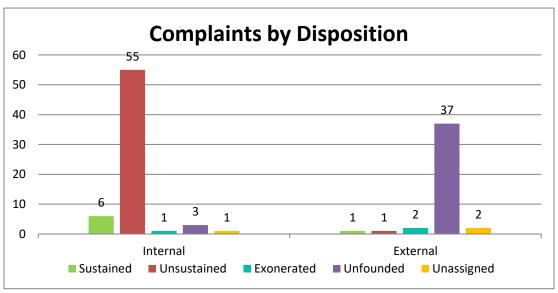
Complaints received by the Unit are categorized as either internal, stemming from department personnel, or external, originating from community members. In 2023, the Office of Professional Responsibility Unit recorded 109 inquiries and reviews, leading to formal administrative investigations in nine of those cases.

The Quality Assurance Unit comprises a Police Sergeant and a Public Safety Technician. Their job is to clearly outline all policies, procedures, goals, and objectives. This clarity helps in their correct interpretation and implementation, ultimately aiming to minimize risk and liability. Additionally, the Unit oversees the maintenance of standards across the Department to meet accreditation requirements.

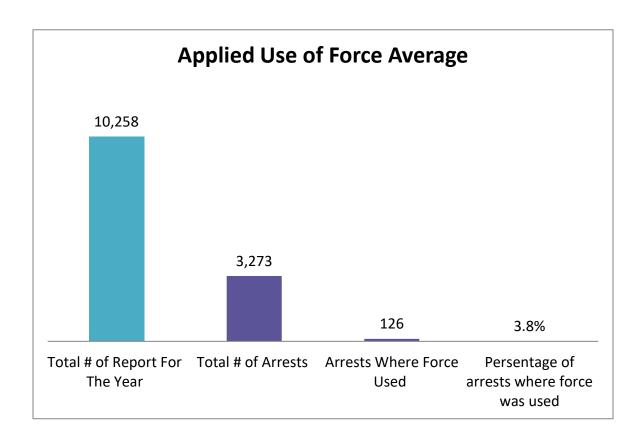




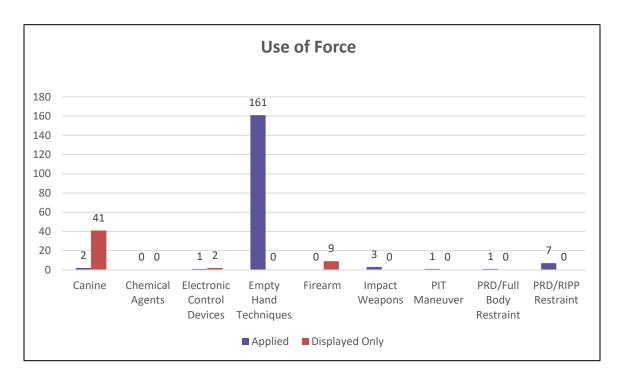

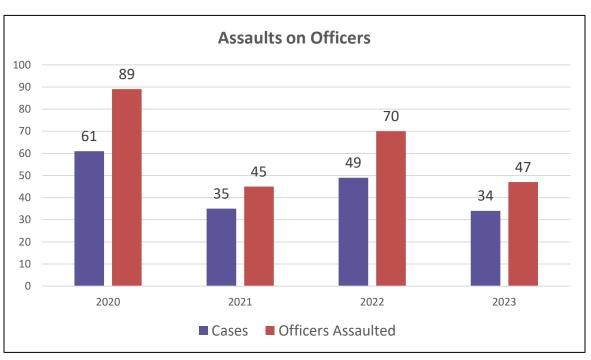

The Hiring & Recruitment Unit (HRU) plays a critical role in ensuring the Department maintains a qualified and diverse workforce. By administrating the hiring process for Police Recruits/Cadets, Professional staff, and assignments for internal specialty units, the HRU helps to ensure that the Department can meet its staffing needs and provide efficient and effective law enforcement services to the community.

The HRU is responsible for retaining and purging employment application documents according to federal, state, and city regulations. It is essential to maintain compliance with legal requirements to ensure the security and confidentiality of applicant information.

Hundreds of applications were processed in 2023, resulting in the hiring of 54 Sworn Police Officers and Professional staff members. This effort demonstrates their commitment to bringing in new talent, strengthening the Department's ranks, and contributing to the overall effectiveness and efficiency of department operations.



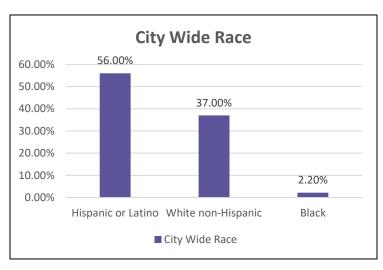


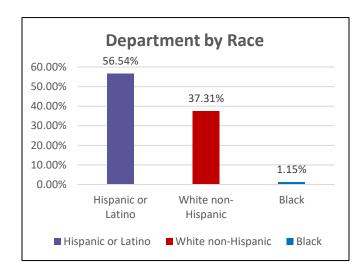


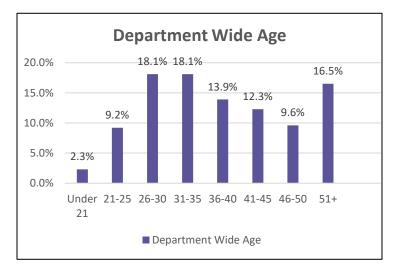

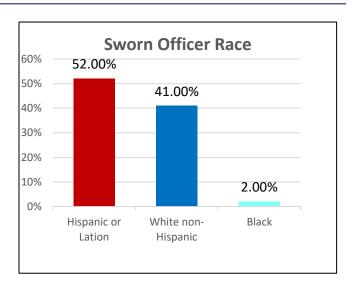


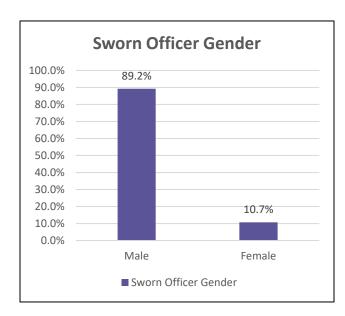


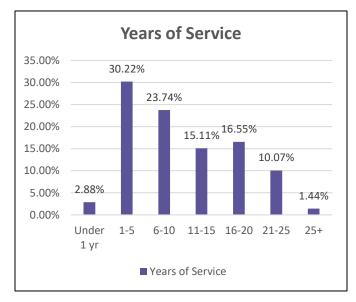


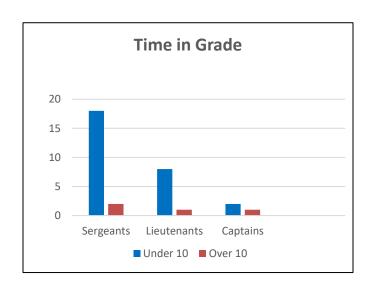












Division Overview

ADMINISTRATION:

The Chief of Police and Deputy Chief of Police serve as the senior law enforcement and public safety officials for the City. They plan, organize, and direct the overall functions of the Department and its employees to ensure effective and efficient operation.

A Captain is assigned to command each of the three Divisions: Patrol, Criminal Investigation and Support Services. Division Captains oversee resource management, fiscal allocation, administer strategic goals, and operational objectives as outlined by the Office of Chief of Police.

The Professional Standards Unit is comprised of a Police Lieutenant and two Police Sergeants that investigates, tracks, and documents the majority of internal and external complaints of alleged employee misconduct and reports directly to the Office of Chief of Police.

The Public Affairs Unit is comprised of a Police Sergeant, a Police Officer and one Public Safety Technician. They are the primary points of contact for the news media. The Public Affairs Unit leads the Department in community engagement such as the Citizens Police Academy, G.A.I.N. event and Scary and Safe.

The Office of Professional Services is supervised by one Civilian Manager. This mangerer oversees Hirring and Recruiting and Training,





Division Overview

PATROL DIVISION:

Patrol Division staff are the first responders to the public's calls for service. The Division consists of four Patrol Squad Bureaus, the Special Services, and Animal Control Bureau.

At full staff, the Division is comprised of a Captain, five Lieutenants, 13 Sergeants, one Corporal, approximately 100 sworn Police Officers and approximately 30 professional staff members, including Public Safety Technicians, Civilian Accident Investigators, Animal Control Officers and administrative support employees.

The Squad Bureaus consist of eight Patrol squads that provide 24/7 call response. Patrol officers proactively deter crime, respond to calls for service, complete initial investigations, and provide routine traffic enforcement.

The Special Services Bureau is comprised of the Traffic, School Services, and Administrative Services Units. These units provide traffic enforcement and control, education, collision investigation, engagement with and enforcement relevant to schools, fleet management and a wide variety of administrative functions respectively.

The Animal Control Bureau provides public education and enforcement relevant to animal licensing, animals at large, and various animal related ordinances.





Unit Spotlight

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

At full staff, the Special Operations Group consists of a Police Sergeant, eight Officers and a Patrol Support Technician. The unit proactively patrols Yuma, focusing specifically on criminal street gangs, narcotics, and violent criminal activity, as well as fugitive apprehension. The unit is responsible for graffiti abatement, Crime Free Multi-Housing, and various intelligence and analytical functions.

SCHOOL SERVICES

The School Services Unit consists of a Police Sergeant and ten School Resource Officers (SROs.)

The unit provides law enforcement services to three school districts that consist of middle and high school schools within the city limits. The School Services Unit provides a law enforcement presence on school campuses, teaches law related education, and assists in the development of safety plans for each school.



K-9

The Department's K-9 Unit is comprised of a Sergeant, four sworn canine handlers and their K-9 partners. The unit specializes in illegal drug detection, building searches, subject tracking, and tactical apprehensions. The unit trains on a weekly basis, regularly partnering with our Special Enforcement Team and other local law enforcement agencies. The K-9 unit is recognized state-wide as subject matter experts in their field.



In 2023, the K-9 unit collectively located and seized 5.8 grams of cocaine, approximately three pounds of fentanyl, .54 grams of heroin, 292 grams of methamphetamine, approximately \$22,000 in cash, five guns, and conducted nine subject apprehensions (two bites and seven surrenders).

SPECIAL ENFORCEMENT UNIT

The Special Enforcement Team (SET), adept in handling high-stakes situations, is charged with the execution of high-risk warrants, the deployment of advanced tactical responses, and the execution of operations demanding a level of proficiency, tactics, and equipment beyond the standard patrol divisions' capabilities. This unit is structured around core leadership roles, including team leaders and assistant team leaders, each bringing a wealth of experience

and specialized expertise. Comprising tactical operators, a dedicated technical support cadre, and a specialized hostage negotiation contingent, the YPD team's composition is meticulously tailored to meet the complex demands of its operational environment.

Operational readiness remains the team's utmost priority, a standard maintained through rigorous bi-weekly training regimens and consistent strategic partnerships with fellow tactical entities within the Yuma and southern Arizona sectors. This symbiotic relationship enhances their tactical understanding and establishes the SET's pivotal presence within the local tactical community, ensuring they remain at the forefront of specialized enforcement capabilities.



ANIMAL CONTROL SERVICES

The Animal Control Unit is supervised by one civilian Sergeant, five Animal Control Officers, and one support staff member. The mission of the Yuma Police Department Animal Control Unit is the delivery of professional, courteous, and effective animal-related services to the community. The Unit is responsible for stray, abandoned, neglected, and mistreated animals, as well as the enforcement of State and Local animal related laws and ordinances.

TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT & ACCIDENT INVESTIGATIONS

At full strength, the Traffic Unit is supervised by two Police Sergeants and staffed with seven Motor Officers, a Traffic Collision Detective, two DUI officers, and ten Civilian Investigators. The mission of the Traffic Unit is to prevent and investigate traffic collisions and expedite the flow of traffic. They accomplish this through community education and routine traffic enforcement. The Traffic Unit also provides event planning and traffic control plans for several civic events within the City.

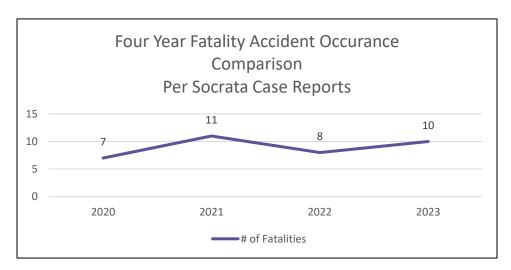

Division Overview

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION:

The Criminal Investigations Division is managed by one Police Captain, two Police Lieutenants, and three Police Sergeants. The Division consists of 16 Police Detectives and five direct support personnel.

The Investigations Division investigates most felonious crimes committed in our community. The Division is divided into the Violent Crimes Bureau, Property Crimes Bureau, and the Criminal Intelligence and Analytics Unit.

The Violent Crimes Bureau is supervised by two Police Sergeants. The Investigators are responsible for follow-up investigations such as homicides, aggravated assaults, sex crimes, crimes against children, armed robbery, domestic violence, and missing persons.

Property Crimes Bureau is supervised by a Police Sergeant. The Bureau is responsible for follow-up investigations such as residential and business burglaries, stolen vehicles, narcotics, fraud, financial crimes, and firearms. The Bureau has two Public Safety Technicians assigned to assist with follow-up, forfeitures, and case investigations.

Computers, cell phones, and digital media are evidence features of most major crimes committed today. The Digital Forensics Unit is comprised of two detectives trained in the unique and complex characteristics of locating and retrieving digital evidence.

The Criminal Intelligence and Analytics Unit is a new addition to the Criminal Investigations Division and is currently comprised of 1 Crime Analyst, 1 Public Safety Technician, and a records specialist. The Unit's primary duty is to collect, collate, and convert information and data into actionable intelligence for use by all divisions within the department.





Division Overview

SUPPORT SERVICES DIVISION:

The Support Services Division offers administrative and technical services in support of the Yuma Police Department's operational functions. This Division is comprised of three Bureaus and a Unit, handling a wide range of responsibilities including training personnel, supporting the police academies, managing police records, overseeing 911 emergency communications, and providing technical and support services. At full staff, the Division consists of a Captain, a Lieutenant, three Civilian Managers, a Sergeant, eleven Civilian Supervisors, and several officers and professional staff.

The Public Safety Communications Bureau provides dispatching services for a range of critical

situations, including law enforcement, animal control, fire, and medical emergencies, as well as non-emergency situations. The Bureau provides service for citizens, officers, and firefighters by upholding high standards of conduct and maintaining a rigorous training program. Annually, the Communications Bureau processes approximately 189,000 telephone calls for service, demonstrating its efficiency and reliability in serving the community's needs. When fully staffed, the Bureau is comprised of a Dispatch Manager, six Dispatch Supervisors, 30 Dispatchers, and an Administrative Specialist.



The Training Unit operates under the guidance of a Civilian Supervisor. It includes a team composed of a Police Sergeant, two Training Officers, an Academy Recruit Training Officer (RTO), and a Civilian Training Specialist. The primary role of this unit is to oversee, develop, and manage the Department's basic training and advanced training programs.

The Records Bureau is the official Public Record keeper for the Department. Records are kept pursuant to state mandated retention schedules. They provide agency records and statistics to other law enforcement agencies, courts, probation departments, and the public. The professional staff of the Bureau is comprised of a Records Manager, two Records Supervisors, twelve Record Specialists, three full-time Administrative Assists, two part-time Administrative Assistants, and one Administrative Specialist.



The Technical and Support Services Bureau provides forensic science examinations and management of evidence. The Bureau is divided into two units, the Forensic Services Unit, and the Evidence Unit, managed by the Technical and Support Services Manager. The Forensic Services Unit

consists of a team of four Forensic Technicians and two Video Analysts, all overseen by the Forensic Services Supervisor. They leverage the latest technology and their expertise to deliver high-quality, accurate, objective, and timely forensic science examinations. The Evidence Unit is responsible for processing all evidence types, including receiving, documenting, storing, and releasing. The Evidence Unit is made up of a team of four Evidence Technicians, overseen by the Evidence Supervisor.



Unit Spotlight

TRAINING UNIT

The Training Unit, managed by a civilian supervisor and supported by a mix of sworn and civilian personnel, is dedicated to delivering superior training programs and ensuring adherence to the Arizona Peace Officers Standards and Training (POST) guidelines. This unit is pivotal in facilitating advanced training initiatives and maintaining compliance with state mandates for law enforcement education and practices.

One of the unit's key responsibilities includes stationing an officer at the Arizona Western College Regional Law Enforcement Training Academy. Serving as a recruit training officer, this officer offers guidance, training, and mentorship to academy attendees, significantly contributing to their development through various classes annually.

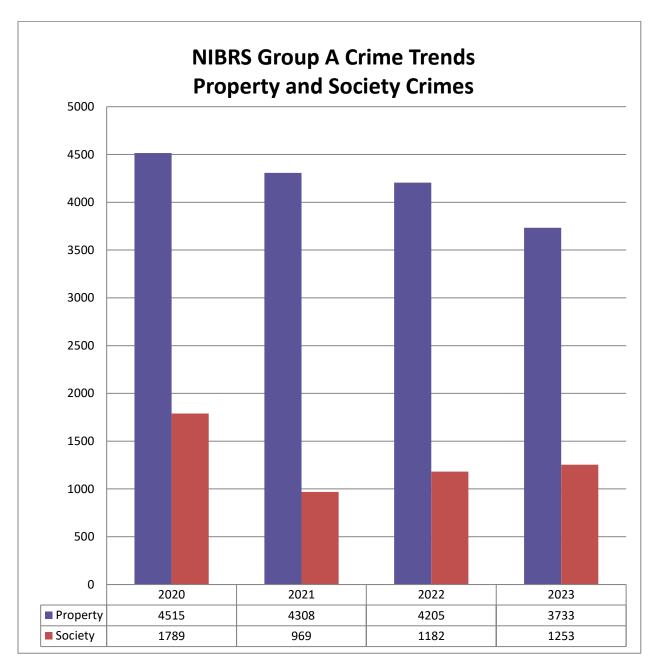
Moreover, the Training Unit orchestrates the Department's Cadet Officer Training Program, aimed at recruiting and training young aspirants interested in law enforcement careers who are yet to meet the age requirement of 21 for formal academy training.

Key achievements of the Training Unit encompass:

- Continuous training for sworn personnel, focusing on legal aspects, search and seizure procedures, and report writing skills.
- Introduction of mental health resiliency training to support officer well-being.
- Successful provision of mandatory Arizona POST proficiency and ongoing skills training for all sworn officers, ensuring the department's compliance and success in annual state training audits.
- Offering ongoing active shooter response training to prepare first responders for highstakes situations.
- The Training Unit has implemented a robust program featuring over 100 unique training sessions, meticulously crafted to foster officer development and ensure compliance with evolving laws. These sessions provide over 100 hours of continuing and proficiency training annually for our officers, not counting the additional classes our dedicated instructor conducts for ongoing instructor development.

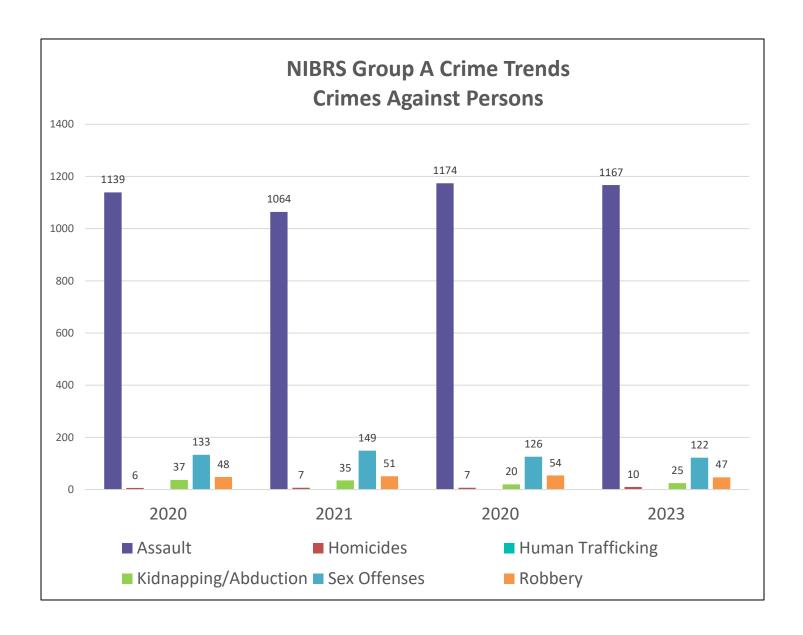




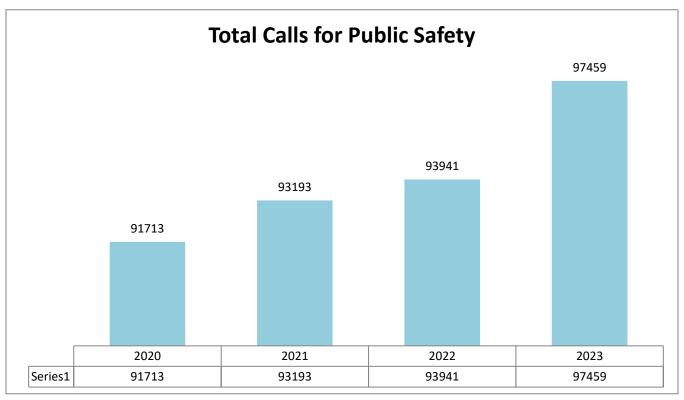
